### Coding Reminder: How to Report Multiple Surgeons For One Operative Session

To help ensure your claims are processed accurately, please use the following guidelines to help you code claims for procedures where two or more surgeons are required to perform surgery on the same patient during the same operative session:

- UnitedHealthcare Community Plan allows reimbursement for only one assistant surgeon. Please use modifiers 80, 81, 82 or AS for the same surgical procedure.
- When two surgeons work together as primary surgeons performing distinct parts of a procedure, they are considered co-surgeons. Please use modifier 62 to identify them.
- Three or more surgeons working together in an operative session are considered a team. They should be identified with modifier 66.

These modifiers align with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) reporting guidance.
